TS 570 SG REVIEW

Just picked this rig up at the Dayton Hamvention and had been planning on getting one after researching reviews on eHam on the IC746Pro, TS870, IC706MKIIG, IC718, and TS570SG.

Got the radio on the air last night after about a half hour of reading through the necessary info in the manual and tracing out all the wiring from the TS450S that was pulled from the station a year ago. Was able to get it going in time for a nightly net I frequent on 75 meters, so I was seeing signals and hearing audio that I was used to on the 450S.

I Played around with the NR1, DSP Cuts, IF Shift, Beat Cancel, ATT, Pre-Amp and Rcv EQ in combinations until I found a Receive configuration that is very pleasant to listen to, and with little variations on the ATT/Pre-Amp combining, can come up with great receive on any signal, weak or strong.

After the net I hung around for the regulars and went to work on the TX config and audio. The Auto-Tuner liked my IAC Double-Bazooka Inverted Vee and tuned in about 5 Sec. no problem. I was good to go and worked on tweaking the Mic and Proc settings, taking audio reports that were very complimentary. Using a Heil HM-10 mike on a boom with an HC-5 Cartridge is giving me a nice "Smooth" audio using no EQ on TX.

I would like to try one of the Inrad SSB Filters in this one to compliment the receiver.

The radio looks like my old TS450S case and seems to basically be a souped up 450S, adding the EQ's, the Auto-Tuner, DSP, TX Monitor, Large LCD Display. I like the auto Beat Cancel for knocking out tuner-uppers on SSB. You can't beat it for the money, a nice all around general use rig. I'm enjoying the Rcv audio and the way I can quiet the radio down and still hear plenty of desired audio, especially on the HF Mobiles on all the "Cars" nets. I'm pulling out mobiles on 40 mtrs up to a 1000 mile radius using an IAC Half Sloper. It takes some tweaking and combinations of DSP, ATT and Pre-Amp but it is way hotter on Rcv than the old TS450S was. I've had it on all afternoon and evening today just listening off the upstairs extension speaker, smiling and enjoying the choice I made! It certainly puts the fun of Amateur Radio in a nice simple little package. Kenwood Audio, Kenwood Quality.

Club Repeater Has Backup Power

The CCARA repeater (147.045) has a new battery backup power system, thanks to the efforts of Bruce, KE8XM and Tom, KB8HEA.

We were able to install a solid state power relay system, and a

deep cycle battery for the repeater. In the event of an AC power failure, the battery will immediately take over and supply full power for the repeater. The battery should last several hours of full repeater operation, and many more if under intermittent standby conditions.

There appears to be some more tweaking necessary to the system. We discovered recently, after a power outage of many hours, that the main power supply does not have sufficient current capabilities to power the transmitter and charge the depleted battery at the same time. We will continue to work on the system to obtain the best performance possible, while being able to provide for emergency communications during power failures.

Emergency personnel involved include fire departments, sheriff officers, ARES, REACT, hospital workers, Red Cross, Emergency Management along with some others depending on the situation.

Sometimes these drills are done as "table top" discussions and sometimes as actual simulation with the various agencies doing just as they would in case of a true disaster.

After these practice drills, those involved meet and discuss how they thought things went, good points and also places for improvement.

These drills are used as learning experiences to help everyone be more prepared in time of a true emergency. It is better to know what to do before the emergency than during. These practice drills also give the various agencies a chance to learn what the others are to be doing and be able to recognize the people you are working with.

REQUIRED:

PHOTO ID (driver's license) or two forms of non-photo ID.
Persons without photo IDs, and/or young persons must supply TWO forms of alternate identification to satisfy their ID requirements.
These two items can include:
Non-photo ID/driver's license;
Social Security Card (as FCC presently requires each applicant to supply a taxpayer ID number

also known as our Social Security Number); Birth Certificate (must have the appropriate seal); Minor's work permit or school report card; Utility bill, bank statement or other business correspondence that specifically names the person; A postmarked envelope addressed to the person indicating the same mailing address as shown on Form 605; or an employment ID.

CURRENT ORIGINAL AMATEUR
RADIO LICENSE and COPY (if you have one)

ORIGINAL valid CSCE(s) that apply and COPY (if you have them)

Social Security number or FCC issued FRN (FCC Registration Number). (The FRN is viewable by doing a search for LICENSE at the FCC WTB ULS web page (http://wireless.fcc.gov/uls/). An FRN is a ten digit number preceded by three or four zeros then six or seven numbers.)

We have NCVEC 605 forms at session.
