



W8CCA QSL



ARISS Announces Roy Neal, K6DUE, ISS Commemorative Event

(Nov 11, 2003) -- The Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS) international team has announced an on-the-air event to commemorate Roy Neal, K6DUE, who died August 15. ARISS has requested that the ISS Expedition 8 crew of commander Mike Foale, KB5UAC, and Alex "Sasha" Kaleri, U8MIR, communicate from space with earthbound radio amateurs during the November 29-30 weekend. Those contacting the ISS by voice (NA1SS) or packet (RS0ISS) through the end of December will be eligible for a special anniversary event certificate.

Go to www.oarc.com/ and try out the search feature. Click on, find a coordinated repeater. You can find repeaters in Ohio by frequency, band, county or city. This search engine will allow you to find a repeater by frequency, band, county, or city. Band searches are for 28, 50, 144, 220, 440, 900, 1215, and 2300 mhz. They also pass out free Ohio Repeater Directories at the Hamvention in Dayton each year. They have a booth near the Buckeye Bells

Tower/Antenna Raising

If you happen to be in the neighborhood of 1434 East Main Street in Coshocton, be sure to check out the latest Amateur Radio tower to go up in the area. On Saturday, November 15 there was a tower/antenna raising party at my residence. I am finally able to get on the air across the HF bands, and I have a slightly higher and better location for my VHF/UHF antenna. My new tower and HF beam were both assembled and installed with the help of many people, including Steve Wheatcraft (AA8BN), Randy Fisher (KL7RF), Chad Lawrence (KC8YLH), Donald Dishong, and Keith Sharrock. The latter two are currently unlicensed; I'll have to work on changing that. The tower is a U.S. Tower TMM-33SS 35 foot telescopic tapered tower. My antenna farm now includes a Cushcraft A27010S, and a Sommer XP406. I now have capabilities on 40, 20, 15, 12, 10, 6, and 2 Meters as well as 70 Centimeters. None of this would be possible without the advice and assistance of the terrific people mentioned above as well as the advice and guidance of Dan Hardy (N8VV) and Bruce Adams (KE8XM). We really do have a wonderful local Amateur Radio community with years of experience who are willing to lend a hand to fellow Amateurs. I am grateful to be part of Amateur Radio and to be associated with such a fine bunch.
